

The Mosaic Company has had a significant impact on the lives of cancer patients, their loved ones and our communities.


They quietly donated over \$600,000. This is an incredible commitment to improving cancer patient care, treatment and outcomes in Saskatchewan.



Conexus Takes the Lead

The 4D Computed Tomography (CT) Simulator Community Campaign

ope can be anything for a cancer patient. From the unending support of family and friends to knowing the latest technology is there when they need it.

Almost half of all patients who hear the words, 'you have cancer', will need radiation. No one can get radiation without a CT simulation; it is a vital piece of equipment. The Saskatchewan Cancer Agency's two CT Simulators were at the end of their life. They needed to be replaced.

On September 1, 2019, we launched the 4D CT Simulator Community Campaign. It was our first fundraising initiative. The goal was to raise \$3 million for two new 4D CT Simulators — one each for the Agency's Allan Blair Cancer Centre (ABCC) in Regina and the Saskatoon Cancer Centre (SCC).

New 4D technology has better quality images, which improves treatments and patient outcomes.

Saskatchewan is a province that takes care of those in need. From bake sales to gala events, people have stepped up to support this campaign. 

to this leading-edge technology to ensure they have the best treatment plan possible."

A new 4D CT simulator was installed at the ABCC in 2019 and is operational. It serves around 1,300 patients annually. The CT at the SCC is projected to be installed this year.
